MEETING CALLED TO ORDER/ACCEPTANCE OF AGENDA

A motion was made by Ms. Curran at 6:30 p.m. to accept the agenda for August 9, 2022 second by Mr. Goodrich Unanimous Vote (5-0)

Mr. Vegnani read the following statement:

The Scituate Select Board is committed to providing an environment of respect during meetings. We ask all members to interact in a polite manner even when there is disagreement.

We value the participation of our community and want all participants, including marginalized and minoritized communities, to feel welcomed and respected.

We ask our committee members, and all who participate, to commit to these standards to support and respect our community.

WALK INS – Judi Aronson, 19 Cudworth Road, brought some information before the Board regarding the land where the new Water Treatment Pant may be built. Ms. Aronson feels there is an issue with the number of acres of land where there are 11 acres and now it indicates 15 acres. Mr. Vegnani said they will ask Mr. Boudreau to look at the title search that was done for the Town to purchase the property.

REPORT OF THE TOWN ADMINISTRATOR -

1. The total number of Covid cases for this past week according to our MAVEN data was 9, down from 14 last week. We had a positivity rating over the last 14 days of 10.41% up from 8.94%. Plymouth County is at 8.68, up from last week of 8.54%. State wide the positivity rate yesterday for the past 7 days was 7.97%, down very slightly from last week's 8.08%. Statewide there are 57 individuals in ICU, up from 48. 15 patients are intubated down from 19. So local numbers have increased while state wide the numbers are down for the second straight week.

We are not done with COVID yet. Although it is only one week, the numbers are trending up. There is a new Omicron variant, BA-2 that is now the dominant strain in the US. At this point, being vaccinated is a much better defense than not being vaccinated, so please, if you have not yet gotten vaccinated and can receive the vaccine, we urge you to do so. Vaccinations and booster are widely available. Go to mass.gov for details.

2. Water update. Reservoir is at -39", last week we were at -35". Tack factory Pond is still at -8". Average daily demand was at 1.592 MGD down from 1.623 MGD last week. We are currently rated as having severe drought conditions buy the Commonwealth. As the drought worsens, the water tables supplying our wells continue to drop, lowering the output from those wells, making us more dependent on the water treatment plant. The more we have to use the plant, the more Manganese we are putting into the

system and the more discolored water we get. Manganese measured at the WTP is still high and is causing discolored water to go through the plant and into the system. As the temperatures rise, so will the Manganese levels in the water. We are working with our consultants and DEP to try and come up with a short-term fix while we wait for the construction of a new water treatment plant. Hopefully we will get some meaningful rainfall tonight and that will help with the manganese.

If you have brown water, please call the water department or email brownwater@scituatema.gov

Rainfall over the last 7 days was 1.17" measured at the Plant.

With the worsening of drought conditions and the strains being placed on our wells, we have implemented a Tier 4 water ban. This is a total ban on all non-essential outside water use. This includes vehicles and boats at marinas. The water department will be fining violators. We have fined over 75 violators since putting the ban in place. Fines can be as high as \$300 a day. Details of the ban can be found on the town web site. We all need to do our best to conserve water during these drought conditions.

Celco will working on Ridge Hill road and finishing work on old Driftway. Old Driftway will be paved by the drew company.

- 3. The Sanctuary at Herring Brook was scheduled to hold a lottery for the affordable housing units on August 8, 2022. Those chosen in the lottery will be notified by SEB.
- 4. The paving contractor for the Town is working on Old Oaken Bucket, Maple Street and Woodland. There were also be paving today on Hatherly in the vicinity of Toll Brothers. This is an overlay project. The Town currently has \$1.076 in Chapter 90 road projects approved by the state to move forward. We have approximately another \$1.2 million in state and local dollars that we will be committing to road and sidewalk work.
- 5. Congratulations to Nancy holt and her finance team, including Pam Avitabile and Joe DeVito for being the first community in the state to have our schedule approved by the Department of Revenue (DOR). Schedule A is a statement of revenues, expenditures and other financing sources, uses and changes in fund balances and certain balance sheet account information that is prepared annually by Nancy and the team. Schedule is required for federal reporting purposes. Failure to file leads to a withholding of state aid until filed.
- 6. The Town will be hosting a Home Elevation seminar in conjunction with MEMA on August 30 from 5:00 6:00 in the Scituate Library Community Room. This free seminar will answer questions about home elevation projects, why a home owner should consider it, how much it might cost and opportunities for funding among other topics. Interested residents should email our Coastal Resource Officer Corey Miles at cmiles@scituatema.gov so we can get a handle on how many people might attend.
- 7. Two weather related updates. We are expecting a break in the hot weather with a cold front moving through the area starting later today and this evening. Isolated severe thunder storms with heavy winds and rain are possible. Be aware of your surroundings should one of these storms break out. Also, starting tonight we will be experiencing astronomically high tides. Low lying areas prone to flooding, particularly Cole Parkway and Mill Wharf parking lot could see minor flooding during the evening tides.

- 8. \$367,000 Seaport Economic Council grant for the permitting and design of dredging in Scituate Harbor. 4 areas- Lobster association area, Maritime center, Cole parkway and town pier. Once the design and permitting are complete, we will apply to the Seaport for dredging funds. The channel is the responsibility of the Army Corps of engineers.
- 9. Although it may seem early with temperatures forecast to reach close to 100 on Thursday, the Town is looking for plow drivers for the winter and for positions in the DPW, interested parties should contact the DPW.

Ms. Curran thanked the DPW Water Department for working hard to solve people's brown water problems where they can. Ms. Curran used Briarwood as an example of where the water department could help.

Ms. Connolly thanked the financial team for their state recognition in submitting their DOR report.

Ms. Curran excused herself from the meeting at 6:52 p.m. and will return later in the meeting.

Special Town Meeting Warrant Planning Board Articles, Karen Joseph, Town Planner Ms. Joseph reviewed the warrant articles with the Select Board. The numbers are currently incorrect and the Planning Board would like to correct the numbers to avoid confusion and clarify. It is a housekeeping article. The diagram is inconsistent with the language.

• ARTICLE 7 Amend Zoning Bylaws – Section 750 Design Review for Business, Commercial, Mixed Use and Multi-Family Development – Setback, Step back & Street Enclosure

This article eliminates penthouses. The planning has had some instances where they are trying to propose penthouses. They would like to eliminate this from any projects. Ms. Connolly asked about wind turbines on roofs of buildings. Ms. Joseph said she will look at that and may revise for Spring Town Meeting.

• ARTICLE 8. Amend Zoning Bylaws – Section 750 Design Review for Business, Commercial, Mixed Use and Multi-Family Development – Penthouses

Chair Vegnani said the Board will vote later in the Select Board meeting after all remaining articles are reviewed.

Move to approve Article 7 to amend Section 750 of the zoning bylaws relevant to setback, step back, and street enclosures and Article 8 to amend Section 750 of the zoning bylaws relevant to penthouses. Motion by Mr. Goodrich second by Ms. Connolly Unanimous Vote Goodrich, Connolly, Vegnani (3-0) Ms. Curran abstained from voting. Ms. Canfield was not in attendance at the meeting during the time of the vote.

Ms. Hayes provided a third update to the Building Use Policy. They will not allow private events at the Senior Center. They will still use the building to host boards, committee's and community events. The document is edited to convey this. \$40 an hour for the custodial fee is added to the policy. Ms. Hayes provided examples of community groups.

Susannah Green 337 First Parish Road said it looked great. The parking across the street should be clarified to state central field. Ms. Hayes said she manages the overflow parking if needed. Ms. Hayes will make the change to read at Central Field.

Glades Rd. Stairs DPW, Sean McCarthy, Town Engineer

• Northern Construction Emergency Repairs to Glades Road Access Stairs up to \$419,000 This topic was reviewed at the last Select Board meeting and drawings reviewed with the Board. Ms. Canfield and Ms. Curran met with North Scituate Beach Association and residents to see the plans and review the contract before the Board. There are six access points and four are the sets of stairs. Ms. Curran asked Mr. McCarthy to explain the monetary increments for each staircase. If costs change, a change order would be required. Jim Mahoney, North Scituate Beach Improvement provided additional resident petition signatures. The stairs are very dangerous and need to be replaced. Ms. Curran said we are not making these stairs ADA compliant or replacing them. Christian Putnam, 81 Glades Road said there is really only one pubic access to the public beach. The ADA blue mat next to the post office is a right of way to access the beach and not a public entrance. Lee Slattery, 61 Glades road said there are numerous opportunities for accidents and a very dangerous situation. Penny Scott Pipes, 8 booth Hill Road, a long time Scituate resident said we need access to the beach. In between tides there is no beach there due to high tide. She prefers to see Gannett made safer and repair one staircase. Ann Burbine, 10 Pennycress Road, suggests we repair all the stairs. She said let's do it once and do them all and be done with it. It is up to Town meeting to decide. Robert Trembly, 71 Glades road said they walk the beach all seasons. Being able to use the stairs at different areas of the beach is beneficial. It's a tremendous resource for public access. Joe Howie, Cliff Estates, said people from all over Town use the beach. The stairs are very dangerous. Rich Shea, 39 Glades Road thanked the DPW for the design work and the plan to get this done. The stairs are currently below standard. Access matters for many people using the beach. Once you get all the resources and get the team on site we should go for it and approve it all. Leslie Dienel, 3 Cliff Estates Road, has lived there 30 years and it would be great for everyone to be able to walk down all the stairs. She supports doing all four stairs. Chris Carchia, 119 Stockbridge Road and Chair of

Capital Planning. The recommendation would be to do them all due to escalating costs. Mike Walker Cliff Estates Road said the coastline defines Scituate and anything along the coast is an asset and establishes our identity. Now is the opportunity to repair the stairs. They have been neglected for too long. We need to show we are proud of this asset.

Ms. Connolly appreciates everyone being here. She does not think this improves access for all people. She would rather see the money spent on the northern end of Glades Road. The Gannett Road entrance needs to be addressed. There is no parking along the side streets or Glades Road. Ms. Connolly thinks we should allow summer parking on Glades Road to have access to the beaches. Ms. Connolly recommends two at each end and repair to the ramp.

Ms. Curran put a pause on this project. She does believe all four stairs need to be repaired.

Mr. Goodrich is in favor of repairing all four staircases. It gives him great pause to vote for something that is not ADA compliant.

Ms. Canfield thinks the engineering department has been looking at this for many years. Thee master plan was just completed. The number one asset to the community is our beaches. It benefits many people in Town. The parking lot is full all the time and is a well-used asset. Money was approved to improve the parking lot at Minot. She thinks with the economy of scale it makes sense to repair all four stairs. They really are unsafe and a chain across does not reflect well on us. This is recommended by our DPW department and we have the funding for all four stairs.

Mr. Vegnani does not think that all four staircases need to be repaired. He thinks if we don't fix it now we'll never go back. There will be too many other projects that are needed. The costs will continue increasing.

Ms. Connolly would like parking at Glades Road more accessible for the public and have it on a future agenda.

Move to award a contract for the emergency repairs to Glades Rd Access Stairs to Northern

Construction Service, LLC for a total sum not to exceed \$419,000. Motion by Ms. Curran second by Ms. Canfield Unanimous Vote (5-0)

Mr. Flaherty is trying to save the post for the next generation. He has been running it for the past year. The hours are currently 4 pm -11 p.m. every day except Monday. Win the Fall and Winter they are open seven days a week. In November, there was an argument between patrons. He is not a member and they have a no trespass notice to prevent him from entering the VFW post. The police were called and he was arrested.

Special Town Meeting Warrant Articles Jim Boudreau, Town Administrator & Nancy Holt, Finance Director

Article 5 Capital Improvement Plan, Chris Carchia, Chair, Capital

Mr. Carchia said they met with Waterways and the demand for dock space is high. The dock rates are very low and have not increased for 12 years. 95% of slips are leased to residents. Capital Planning requested Waterways raise the dock rates. If Seaport does not pick up the cost the additional to the Town is \$142,000 annually. They do support the project. Brian Kelly, Waterways met with the Capital Planning Committee last week. At this point Waterways is not in agreement with the requirement to raise rates. We need to compare with other Town Marina's rather than private marinas.

1. Additional Funds for Cole Parkway Marina Dock Replacement \$1,275,000

The School Department came to Capital Planning to discuss the Jenkins School Roof. He needs authorization from the Town before applying for grant applications. The school is also exploring solar options. We have to authorize the borrowing. It was on the FY23 Capital plan and deferred to FY24. It is not eligible for MSBA.

2. Jenkins School Roof \$1,235,000

The Police Department requested the boat for a port security plan. This is the Town share of the grant. The retired boat would be sold at auction to offset the cost. The current boat is 15 years old and the engines are brand new. The salvage value is between \$130and \$175,000. There is no expectation to keep two boats. The Capital Planning Committee voted unanimous. Mr. Boudreau said if we don't get the grant we don't get the boat. We will need to replace it eventually and can take advantage of the grant while the older boat still holds value.

3. Town Share of Grant for SAFE Boat (Police) \$145,800

The Fire Department has moved this up in the plan because it takes two years to get a new ambulance. The ambulance being replaced on a rotating basis. Oldest ambulance out and replaced by the new ambulance. Given the lead time and escalated cost it is prudent to move it up now on the schedule.

4. Ambulance \$435,719

This is for emergency repairs to the exiting Water Treatment Plant.

5. Emergency Water Treatment Plant Repairs \$250,000

Ms. Curran returned to the meeting at 8:00 p.m.

The Board thanked the Capital Planning Committee for their work on this. Chair Vegnani said the Board will vote later in the Select Board meeting after all remaining articles are reviewed.

Article 6 Community Preservation Act Projects, Dan Fennelly, CPC Chair

Mr. Fennelly said there were originally nine articles but beach nourishment is not allowed under CPC guidelines. The Wheeler window replacement was tabled as more information was needed.

1. 90' Baseball Field – Recreation

There is a need for two 90' baseball fields in Town. Mark Novak from Activitas joined Mr. Fennelly to review the Baseball Field recommendation. The survey was received three weeks ago and they will be going to Advisory and Planning Boards. The recommendation is to build this on Central Field. Mr. Novak said all groups participated in the discussion on this including soccer and recreation. There is irrigation currently in the ground at Central and may be modified slightly. This is included in the numbers. This will be a grass field.

2. Cushing Trail Restoration – Open Space/Recreation

This was submitted by a resident to restore a well-used trail connecting Cushing/High School and Utility Road/Aberdeen neighborhood. The trail is in disrepair. The estimated cost is \$170K and \$20K was donated by Morse Engineering. Ann Burbine, 10 Pennycress Road asked DPW and she said they estimated \$50K but this will need to go to bid. Skyler Chick, CC Vice Chair said \$150K they have to remove the existing asphalt and install it new. Frank Snow, Chair of Conservation said it has been used over 50 years and it is in touch shape.

- 3. Wheeler Park Windows Restoration Affordable Housing tabled for more information.
- 4. Beach Commission mobi-mats

This is to repair the mobi mats at the southern entrance of Sand Hills Beach.

5. Historic Preservation Plan

This is to develop a thorough historic preservation plan for the hundreds of historic and cultural resources including buildings, objects, areas, landscapes, burial grounds, etc.

6. Damon Access & Picnic Area – Conservation Commission

This is to finish the project at Damon Access & Picnic Area. Frank Snow, Chair, Conservation Commission, provided an overview of the project.

7. Crosby & Bates Picnic Area – Conservation Commission

This is to finish the project at Crosby & Bates Picnic Area. Frank Snow, Chair, Conservation Commission, provided an overview of the project.

8. Bailey Ellis House Windows, Tower & Door Restoration

This project is to restore and replace tower windows and restoration of the front door at the Bailey Ellis House. This is a continuation of projects for the Bailey Ellis House by the Arts Association and is a historic resource. Robin Glazier and Janet Cornachio of Scituate Arts Association presented an overview of the project.

• Lighthouse Restoration Project Design, Spencer Preservation Group

The Town issued a Request for Qualifications for Designer Services for the restoration of the lighthouse on July 6, 2022. Five proposals were received by the July 22, 2022 due date and were reviewed by a committee including Jeff Martell, Gigi Mirarchi and Bob Chessia of the Scituate Historical Society, Bob Vogel, Kevin Cafferty, Jim Boudreau, Nancy Holt and the OPM Rick Pomroy. Two firms were selected for interviews on August 3, 2022. At the conclusion of the interviews, the seven members (Gigi was not present) decided to move forward with Spencer Preservation Group based on their experience with lighthouses and historic preservation.

The proposal fee covers the following.
