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Advisory Committee Meeting Minutes Thursday, March 7, 2024 Scituate Town Library, 85 Branch St., Community Room – 7:00 pm

Ms. Russo called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Kelly made a motion to accept the agenda which was seconded by Mr. McGuiggin and voted unanimously in favor (8-0).

Mr. McGuiggin made a motion to accept the minutes as amended of the February 29, 2024 meeting which was seconded by Mr. Gilmore. The minutes were voted unanimously in favor (8-0).

Cushing Hatherly Elementary School Report from Capital Planning Committee Chair, Chris Carchia

Mr. Carchia informed members that the Capital Planning Committee voted unanimously (5-0) to support the project. He noted the major concerns stemmed from a lack of specific information to some questions that had been posed. He stated that the more recent informational session presentation addressed some of those concerns. Mr. Gilmore stated he was at the meeting and felt the Committee vetted the project well.

FY25 Budget Updates

Mr. Boudreau provided an update on available revenues voted recently by the Financial Forecast Committee and the Select Board's recommendation for allocation of those funds. The changes to the forecast included lower than expected health insurance renewal, an actual regional school

assessment, the addition of the opioid stabilization funds to support the FACTS budget, an increase in inspection fees to support inspector increases, the Governor's state aid budget and a change in the revenue formula with the School Department. He stated the Select Board voted to support the Roads &Seawalls from the wind turbine and solar array revolving funds. He noted the unfilled zoning enforcement position was not funded in favor of funding an Assistant Council on Aging Director. Mr. Boudreau also noted a few additional hours for his office from the Maritime Revolving Fund for management of that property. Ms. Seidel asked if there were any outstanding enforcement issues that would lapse without the zoning enforcement officer. Mr. Boudreau stated there were other ways to address enforcement.

Mr. Boudreau reviewed the additional \$10,000 in seasonal salaries in the Waterways Enterprise for patrolling the new mooring is Cohasset Harbor. He also went over some line item adjustments in the Water Enterprise budget that amounted to a net \$0. Ms. Seidel asked if we had taken the moorings in Cohasset Harbor and would therefore be responsible for safety and Mr. Boudreau stated yes but they were working on an agreement with Cohasset to address the issues. Mr. McGuiggin asked if the regional sewer was tied to this issue and Mr. Boudreau stated yes and he gave a summation of the different versions of regional sewer over the past seven years. Ms. Metro asked if a larger project would be more economically feasible and Mr. Boudreau responded a larger project that it might get more support. Ms. Russo asked if the small version of the expansion for North Scituate would have the waste stream going to Cohasset or to us and Mr. Boudreau responded it would come to Scituate and that is why the inflow and infiltration projects have been moving forward. Ms. Seidel asked if the MBTA compliance statutes would bring about more state funding for sewer expansion. Mr. Boudreau stated there are funds but the grants are very competitive.

Mr. Gilmore made a motion to accept all the articles in the annual town meeting which was seconded by Mr. McGuiggin and voted unanimously in favor (8-0).

Mr. Gilmore made a motion to reconsider the vote on Article 12 which was seconded by Mr. Kelly which was approved (8-0)

Mr. McGuiggin made motion to approve Article 12 – Community Preservation and Mr. Kelly seconded which was voted majority in favor (7-0-1). Mr. Gilmore abstained.

April 29, 2024 Special Town Meeting Warrant Article

Mr. McGuiggin expressed concern that the useful life of the Wampatuck School was not realistic for another 30 years as presented by the School Department. Mr. Kelly stated that the sewer infrastructure, an operating override for the Police Department and other needs still exist and Wampatuck is another one of those concerns. Ms. Russo noted the School Department's assumption that citizens would not support another school and that is why they were focusing on putting funds into the school. Mr. DiCosimo expressed concern about future enrollment and the stress on the older schools. Ms. Metro asked if there had ever been a discussion of a single elementary school. Ms. Curran stated that in the past a larger school was not supported and the neighborhood school concept is supported. Ms. Ferguson noted that at the time the Jenkins School was proposed, the age of the other schools was noted and the fact that not all the elementary children would be able to attend. He asked if there had been any discussion of schools specific to grades and Ms. Holt responded that it was in the Habeeb report. Mr. Gilmore stated that a comment could be included in the write-up to notate the needs for Wampatuck as well as other concerns. Ms. Russo noted that the points raised in the discussion should be reflected in the write-up regardless of the vote.

Ms. Russo asked for confirmation on the repair option and the displacement of children and why it was a longer period than a new build and Mr. Kelly responded that with the new construction option, the children could remain in the existing building during the construction since the new Hatherly would be built on the existing field. In the case of the repair option, the project would

have to be done in stages, and thus would take longer. Mr. Kelly stated the MSBA would not pay towards a renovation and Ms. Russo stated their website indicated the MSBA would pay. Mr. Boudreau stated that the MSBA might pay but the stretch code requirements would be more expensive as what happened in the high school roof project. Mr. Gilmore noted that the real estate tax impact for repairs versus new is not that different. Ms. Ferguson asked about the average assessed value and whether it is inflated as compared to median. Ms. Ferguson asked when the South Shore Regional Technical School would be coming forward and Mr. Boudreau stated next year.

Mr. Gilmore made a motion to support the construction of a new Cushing Hatherly Elementary School meeting which was seconded by Mr. Kelly. The motion was voted unanimously in favor (8-0).
