## **REPORT OF THE TOWN ADMINISTRATOR-**

Not in attendance at this meeting.

#### **SCHEDULED ITEMS:**

PUBLIC HEARING Tax Classification Hearing, Steven Guard, Chair, Board of Assessors

Mr. Guard said the Board of Assessors (BOA) has voted to approve one tax rate for commercial and residents. The Town comparisons are still in line. The BOA feels it would discourage business in Town and supports the single tax rate to the Select Board.

Move that the Select Board vote to approve the Residential Factor, according to MGL Chapter 58, Section 1A. Motion by Ms. Connolly second by Ms. Canfield Unanimous Vote (4-0)

# PUBLIC HEARING Transfer of Liquor License to H&A Bros., Inc. dba Sand Hills General Store, Adeel Ahmad, President/Manager

Frank Colpoys is here representing the applicant for the Transfer of Annual Wines and Malt Beverages. He is aware the oversight and training are a high priority to the Select Board. The current owner is selling the assets for this business. Nothing will change regarding the store. The expectations will continue to be high with the new owner. The ID scan technology is being purchased by the new owner. Mr. Ahmad is TIPS Certified and his staff will be as well. He has experience in a general store and how it operates. This license is a necessity to the success of this business. Mr. Ahmad worked in a convenience store for a year that also sold beer and wine. He has experience with training employees. The stores were in Falmouth and Hyannis. He does not expect to make any changes at this time. Everything will stay as is currently. Mr. Ahmad is planning to do a full work shift in the store and oversee everything at the store. At times he will be working in the back office on site. His in-laws live in Kingston and will be working at the store also. Mr. Vegnani said the Town of Scituate takes the liquor store very seriously. He cannot stress the importance of not serving under age individuals.

# REVIEW/DISCUSS/UPDATE Senior Tax Relief Opportunities, Joe Divito, Assessor

The Board of Assessors (BOA) will be looking at any additional property tax relief measures that can be adopted beyond the ones already in place detailed below **as Additional Property Tax Relief Options**. In order to evaluate the special means tax exemption; the programs put into place by special legislation in other communities need to be studied to see if one is better than the other. The BOA is also reaching out to the DOR to see if there is any pending legislation that would make a similar standardized exemption available as a local option acceptance. The BOA already has the authority under MGL c. 59 §5(18) (see below) to provide assistance as well. The BOA will provide recommendations on these issues with corresponding cost impact for further town meeting action. The earliest any new exemptions would be benefit taxpayers is FY24 (local option acceptances) and special legislation (FY25). We will put a placeholder on the April ATM list to ensure follow-up.

Existing authority to grant relief by BOA – no local option acceptance required

# MGL c. 59 §5(18): Property; exemptions

Eighteenth, any portion of the estates of persons who by reason of age, infirmity and poverty, or financial hardship resulting from a change to active military status, not including initial enlistment are in the judgment of the assessors unable to contribute fully toward the public charges.

# Local option acceptance required – potential additional relief measure to be accepted

MGL c. 59 §5C1/2: Additional exemption allowed notwithstanding prohibition of first paragraph of Sec. 5

Section 5C1/2. In a city or town that accepts this section and is certified by the commissioner to be assessing all property at full and fair cash valuation, a taxpayer who otherwise qualifies for an exemption pursuant to any clause specifically listed in the first paragraph of section 5 for which receipt of another exemption on the same property is prohibited, shall be granted an additional exemption that shall be uniform for all exemptions and the amount of which shall not exceed 100 per cent of the exemption for which the taxpayer qualifies, as may be determined by the legislative body of the city or town, subject to its charter, not later than the beginning of the fiscal year to which the tax relates. Notwithstanding any provision of this chapter to the contrary, the exemption shall be in addition to any exemption allowable pursuant to said section 5; provided, however, that in no 20221122 ssb meeting minutes

instance shall the taxable valuation of the property, after all applicable exemptions, be reduced below 10 per cent of its full and fair cash valuation, except through the applicability of clause Eighteenth of said section 5; and provided, further, that the additional exemption shall not result in any taxpayer paying less than the taxes paid in the preceding fiscal year. Acceptance of this section by a city or town shall not increase the amount that it otherwise would.

## **Additional Property Tax Relief Options**

The financial team and the Board of Assessors compiled a listing of available property tax relief options to assist those most in need in the community in July 2018. The following tax relief measures have been brought to voters by the Board of Assessors and the Select Board at multiple recent town meetings and supported.

- Local Option Acceptance MGL c. 59 §5 (17E)
  - Provides annual increase in the asset limit (CIP) for exemptions granted to senior citizens surviving spouses and surviving minors for clause 17C and 17D

  - o Lowered requisite age of eligibility to 65
  - o Increase multiple limits to allow more residents to qualify
- Local Option Acceptance MGL c. 59 §5 (41A)
  - o Increased income tax limit for seniors to qualify for property tax deferrals

- Local Option Acceptance Section 4 of c. 73 of Acts of 1986
  - Grants additional exemption of up to 100% for persons qualifying for MGL c. 59 \$5, clauses 17D & 41C

  - o Reduces interest rate on Clause 41A deferrals from 8% to 4%

- Local Option Acceptance MGL c. 40 §42J
  - o Allows taxpayers that qualify to defer their property taxes under MGL c. 59 §5 (41A) to also defer their water charges
- Local Option Acceptance MGL c. 83 §16G
  - o Allows taxpayers that qualify to defer their property taxes under MGL c. 59 §5 (41A) to also defer their sewer charges

The Assessor's office will be holding sessions at the Senior Center to update these property relief options to our seniors. A copy of the presentation was provided to the Select Board for review. Mr. Vegnani suggested any residents who have suggestions or require clarification should contact the Assessor's office. Ms. Connolly reinforced that we do listen to our residents and the BOA will be looking at other opportunities that are outlined above as well.

## **REVIEW/DISCUSS** 2024 Departmental Budget Reviews

• Assessors 141

Joe DiVito Town Assessor provided an overview of his budget. New software is being used to measure property before we go out to the site. It saves some time while doing inspections. Mr. DiVito said he has a great staff in the Assessor's office. The challenge will be the 2024 reevaluations because we haven't had one since 2019. All building permit inspections are done in house.

• Town Clerk 161

Kathy Gardner, Town Clerk is still working on her certification. Election training is ongoing and 2024 will prove to be very busy. 10,521 voters were the turnout for this past election which is 66% of our registered voters. There were 153 ballots that needed to be hand counted. Ms. Gardner will be providing training at the Senior Center and other locations. Ms. Gardner is thankful for her support team throughout departments at Town Hall including her own staff, a great election crew, custodial support and public schools support. It takes months and months to prepare for an election. There were 5,000 voters that participated in early voting or mail in ballots. We have fifty active poll workers. State Elections now being a holiday may allow some younger generations to participate as poll workers.

• Widows Walk Enterprise 61

Ian Kelley, Director, said the new restaurant opened up at Widows Walk. Having this professional operation is great to work with. Last quarter they did just under \$400K and the Town receives 3% of the revenue. The golf course is doing great and the restaurant help retain golfers. The memberships are higher and our afternoon play is higher with the restaurant. The golf course is still impacted by the drought. We are working on getting the underground pipes to water from the pond. Objectives for next year will be to bring the management and maintenance of the course in house rather than a contract with IGM. The conditions of the fairways need to improve. ½ the fiscal year will be IGM and the other ½ town employees. The enterprise fund will pay for the additional employees and all benefits. Mr. Kelley started in April 2020. He would like to make Widows Walk the "George Wright" golf course of the area. Mr. Vegnani said Mr. Kelley has done a spectacular job. A big part of it is Ian. He has improved the whole experience of our golfers. Everyone speaks so highly of our golf director. Injection of the youth of our community is great.

#### • Board of Health 510

Drew Scheele, Director, said we are winding down with COVID and the numbers are 8-20 cases in the course of a week. These are only reported numbers and do not include home test kits. He is still keeping an eye on COVID. Food Service is ongoing with permit eyes and they will begin with other services. Mr. Scheele said he is really happy with this staff. Mr. Vegnani said Mr. Scheele did a great job over the last couple of years with COVID and it was appreciated. Mr. Scheele said he worked well with the other South Shore towns and Department of Public Health. The flu clinics were 575 flu shots. We used to do a lot more. It has changed since the pharmacies started doing flu shots. Restaurant help is always turning over and management is consistent. Serve Safe certification is important to get everyone trained. Joe Murphy, our food inspector does a great job visiting all the restaurants. It is important to keep on the restaurants.

#### • Council on Aging 541

Linda Hayes, Director, said we are on a good trajectory. The staff is well acclimated to their jobs now since many are new. The average attendance is 145 a day with some more than others. Some days are over 200. Over 2000 recorded for last fiscal year. New registrants over 700 just this year at the senior center. The success of the food service program is a big plus. We have over 65 volunteers a week and they have become more streamlined. We have over 126 programs in place. The challenge is coordinating the size of the rooms and program attendance. We could do more with more staff. Ms. Hayes would like to do a strategic plan and the addition of an assistant director would be presented for next fiscal year. There is no request this year for additional staff. Parking is difficult and there was a parking study done. It shows that there is a need for 16 additional spaces. It was brought to the planning board. We do need more handicap parking. A golf cart will be really helpful for the senior center. The Board thanked Linda for doing such a great job.

#### • Recreation 630

Maura Glancy, Director and Nick Lombardo, Assistant Director said they are happy with their new location. The new custodian is fantastic and doing a great job. Recreation is 100% back from COVID. All of their programs are just about selling out. Ms. Glancy thanked her staff for all their hard work. Mr. C's award will be given to Fran McMillen who helps out year after year to help with the docks and boats. He is the "go to" guy for Recreation Sailing. The beaches had a great year and the life guards did a great job. The grass fields are rejuvenating and coming back with the use of the turf fields. Flannery Field will be tough because it is built on clay. We have a lot less complaints regarding availability of fields. Kevin Devin does a great job with the management of the fields. Mr. C has retired and a new company is now running the soccer program. South Shore Select is the company who is running it. Recreation is very happy with the company. Annual community events are great, such as the track day, annual egg hunt, Santa calls. Kids test kitchen is a new program that began and is very successful. Peter Sullivan and Liz Dorgan were the co-directors this year and did a great job. Peggotty Beach re-nourishment funding is provided by recreation. There are still programs in the Scituate Harbor Community Building 2 yoga, 2 Pilates and a ball class. Ms. Curran asked where this could be relocated. Ms. Glancy said there is a room A105 that needs to be cleared out and could be used if needed. Mr. Vegnani thanked Recreation for all they have done. Winter registration is coming up on November 30<sup>th</sup>.

## • Commission on Disabilities 549

Nancy Holt provided an overview of the Commission on Disabilities budget. Accomplishments include the awareness event on October 22<sup>nd</sup> where 33 organizations came together, providing wheelchairs to the library for patrons use, purchased an all-terrain wheelchair that is available in the

Library of Things, a special adaptive chair for the special education students along with other tools for children. The Commission was so helpful with handicap parking at Peggotty Beach and the Board is appreciative of their support, guidance and advice.

#### Veterans Services Advisory Council Amend Charge, Joe Kelley, Chair

We have more people that would like to join the council. We learned on Memorial Day the numbers were low and we need to advertise this more. Mr. Kelley thanked Jim Boudreau for his announcements about events. The flag retirement box went over well and it has already been cleaned out. They discovered the flags were being disposed of improperly. Now this is resolved and it is well received. The next meeting is the first Tuesday of every month. The next one is an open house to meet the council and see what their all about. Ms. Curran thanked Mr. Kelley for all is work on getting this committee up and running. Mr. Kelley said on December 17<sup>th</sup> is Wreaths Across America.

### Move to amend the Veterans Advisory Council charge to add additional members and change the term to 3 years effective immediately. Motion by Ms. Curran second by Ms. Canfield Unanimous Vote (4-0)

## UPDATE/DISCUSS Economic Development Commission (EDC), Sue DiPesa, Chair

• Revised Grant Program

The EDC is working on criteria for funding applications with deadlines, etc. and establishing a more formal process. This will also give the EDC a good tracking mechanism. There will be a draft that will be given to Nancy Holt for review. Once they have a final draft it will be submitted to the Select Board for approval. A celebrate Scituate sub committee is being established by the EDC to enhance the heritage, arts and culture throughout Town. The most visited parts of the site are Heritage, Culture and Recreation. It is a great opportunity for EDC to explore. The EDC approved hosting a summit.

• EDC Business Summit

The purpose of the gathering is to present the mission and vision of the Scituate Visitors center and how it relates to economic development in Scituate. We will hear from the town administrator, a member of the

Select Board, Rep Patrick Kearney and Sen Patrick O'Connor on how support of the Scituate Visitors center can positively impact all active organizations, small businesses, and the wellbeing of the town. We're hoping that each attendee will be prepared to share how their organization could work collaboratively with the Scituate Visitors Center for a shared goal of enhancing the quality and quantity of the visitor's experience and improving the local economy.

This will be the beginning of discussions on how we can ensure that Scituate is prepared to welcome guests by providing needed public restrooms, transportation and presentation of public areas. We will develop a cohesive plan to work together and most importantly, demonstrate and encourage leadership roles in our community. This is an important first step to improving Scituate in many ways.

The meeting is being planned to be held: Scituate Public Safety Building on Tuesday, December 13, 2022 at 6 p.m.

Scituate Visitors Center – Scituate Community Christmas – Scituate Chamber of Commerce – Scituate Beautification Committee – Historic Committee – Scituate Harbor Cultural – Historical Society – Scituate Harbor Business Association – North Scituate Business Association – Scituate Town Administrator, Jim Boudreau, Select Board member, Karen Canfield, Representative Patrick Kearney, Senator Patrick O'Connor.

Ms. Connolly suggested this group could look at organizing grants that are available to our community businesses and cultural groups.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

1. Beach Commission Prototype Beach Signs, Kelly Bower, Chair December 10<sup>th</sup> there will be a clean up at Kent Street Marshes and Peggotty Beach from 9 am to 12 noon.

Ms. Bower presented prototypes to the Select Board of the six beach signs for Scituate. They are double sided carved mahogany signs similar to the library sign. Mr. Vegnani suggested the signs could be removable in case of a large storm. Ms. Connolly suggested adding the name of the Town of Scituate to the sign. The Beach Commission applied to CPC for a grant to fund this request. CPC has requested the Beach Commission go to EDC for partial funding. Conceptually, the Select Board approves the prototype of the signs and would like to add the Town of Scituate. This will need to go through the procurement process. The Board thanked Kelly Bower and the committee for all their hard work.

- 2. Shellfish Advisory Committee Updates, Susan Harrison, Chair
  - a. Next Steps Aquaculture/Shellfish Advisory Committee

The 2019 proposal has changed to mean low seaward and find an aquaculture area there. Merrill Consulting has reviewed and eel grass surveys were completed. A site visit by DMF took place this summer. They surveyed a large area and found no eel grass. A site was located and surveyed by DMF and suitable for aquaculture. The original applicants were asked if they would be interested in the mean low tide. There were nine applicants and now there are four interested. It has been four years and DMF rules and forms have changed. The regulations are updated with DMF changes and provided to the Select Board for review and consideration. Currently we have four applicants who have completed the new DMF form and submitted it along with their original application. The next steps would be to notify the abutters and hold a public hearing. The regulations also need to be updated. The committee will be back in December to review additional regulation updates. Mr. Vegnani asked what the visual impact will be on this new location. Ms. Harrison said there is not a lot of recreation happening in this new area. You would not see much of anything maybe a little bit of the cages at the low tide mark. The Town approves the license and the approval with the minutes goes to the state for final approval. They have been involved all along. The criteria for an abutter are as certified by the assessor's office within 500 feet. The application wants their two-page form. The extensive application in 2019 for the Town of Scituate the location will change. The Shellfish Advisory Committee has held ten public meetings this year and they have all been recorded. They will access the sites via Cohasset Harbor or Scituate by boat. It will be 10 acres out of 250 acres and it is off to the side near the rocks. The Cohasset rowing club requested markers to mark the rocks. Mr. Vegnani said at this point the Select Board is evaluating the situation. We are dealing with the situation with our neighbors in Cohasset. We have to evaluate the project and where we want to proceed with this. There is no other way to proceed right now. Ms. Canfield said we should continue with our housekeeping documents up to date. Scheduling public hearings is part of the process and we should proceed with that. We should continue the process we began four years ago. We are supposed to act on an application within 60 days. Mr. Vegnani said as a Board we have to reevaluate the project in its totality. He does not want to take the next step if we cannot support it. Ms Curran agrees we need to approve our regulation documents. Ms. Curran thanked the Shellfish Advisory Committee for all their work in finding the other lots. The Shellfish committee believes all interests can prevail out there.

Brian Calvin, 92 Beach Street, Cohasset said there is a lot of misinformation on how it is going to impact the sailors. He does not hear clear answers. Mr. Vegnani said the first job of the committee was to scope out where 20221122 ssb meeting minutes 7

this could go. The only intent was to do a pilot program. There are two five-acre areas. There are four people interested in aquaculture in that area. He requests that that stakes are put in the water to outline the locations and that a good map is provided.

Jim Spellman, 49 Border Street, Scituate said this will be open to public hearings. He opposed the project three years ago. Mr. Spellman feels there is a lot of opposition to this and it will not go easily.

Mr. Vegnani said the discussion about property lines has nothing to do with shellfish. There is going to be a problem if Cohasset tries to take authority over Scituate property. It has to do with property rights and sovereignty.

Bill Graham, 14 Tilden Ave said he is disappointed there is not a map to look at tonight to see where this area is going to be. Mr. Graham provided a map to Ms. Harrison. Ms. Harrison said the map tool that is used is the DMF GIS viewer. Mr. Graham said half of the bay is a prohibited area. Mr. Vegnani said there is a GIS map on the Shellfish Advisory page. Ms. Harrison directed Seth Pfeiffer to pull up the map on the Town of Scituate website for Mr. Graham to view.

Jamie Davenport, 16 Booth Hill Road, Scituate believes the incorrect information has been spewed over the past four years and this misinformation has created opposition. All one needs to do is drive to Duxbury to see where the recreation and oyster farms coexist. The area is not trafficked by sailors or rowers. It is all along the channel. The DMF requires a lot of information from aquaculture applicants with pictures.
