

Introduction

The Society has an extraordinary group of items in the Archives from 100 years of collecting (see Appendix I):

These resources were studied and enjoyed by over 580+ visitors over 2014 and 2015. Of these visitors, 280+ were from Scituate and the rest were comprised of visitors from 25 states and 6 countries. In addition, over 500 Scituate students visited the Little Red Schoolhouse during this time period.

The Society's goal of preserving the artifacts and papers that tell us of our heritage, and making that knowledge accessible to any who wish to know of it, is at risk because the Archives are housed in a facility that lacks environmental controls and adequate space.

Current Archives Storage Conditions

- Archives are co-located with the Society's libraries for researchers, but located in 2 rooms in the basement of 43 Cudworth Rd
- The building is >100 years old with cellar walls made of fitted stone subject to dampness, leaks, and dirt
- There is no heat or air conditioning; collections are exposed to heat, humidity, contaminants, insects, rodents, etc.
- Temperature >80 degrees over 8 weeks in 2015
- A suitable environment for mixed collections needs to be consistently cool and dry: 55-60 F and 50% RH (see Appendix II)
- Archive spaces are full there is no room for expansion; historic newspapers and other items are currently stored on open basement shelves; no work area for processing collections or for performing conservation
- Textiles are stored in attic of G.A.R. Hall due to lack of space at 43 Cudworth Road

Current Archives Storage Conditions

Archive Room 1 – Paper-based collections

- 114 linear feet of storage

The Society's Commitment to Collections

- Adopted a formal Collection Policy and related procedures
- Established a Collections Committee that meets several times a year
- Established a budget for archival materials funded through receipts from historic site visits
- Funded the Assistant Archivist position for 10 hours a week
- Supported the use of PastPerfect collections management software
- Scheduled to participate in a 5 month Environmental Monitoring Program offered by the MA Board of Library Commissioners
- Institutional member of the Society of American Archivists (donated by Society member)
- Members of the American Association for State and Local History and New England Museum Association
- Researched grant opportunities for collections management. Attended workshop on grant writing 11/2015 sponsored by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission and MA Historical Records Advisory Board, led by a Preservation Specialist from the MA Board of Library Commissioners.
 - Obtaining funds for collections management difficult for a few reasons: matching funds often required;
 administrative effort is prohibitive; grantors require appropriate methods, practices, and physical environments (its unlikely that a trust would invest in items kept in a cellar with no environmental controls)
 - Advised to seek local funds such as CPC first


