- 3. Water update. We are at +.6", last week we were +5". Tack factory Pond is at +6" down from +3". Average daily demand was at 1.067 MGD up from last week at 855 TGD

Rainfall over the last 7 days was 3" measured at the Plant.

The water department is planning on starting spring flushing of the water mains starting today, Monday, March 20<sup>th</sup>. We will be starting at the Mann Lot storage tank and proceed as follows:

Also water related, the Town and our consultants will be on the property on Rte 3A where we will be building the new water treatment plant later this week to do some test pits for soil sampling as we move forward with the design of the new plant. A notice will be going to out neighboring residents prior to commencement of the work.

The Scituate Sister City Project is in urgent need for Host Families for a visit from Teachers and High School Students from France. 2 Teachers and 19 students are expected to be in Scituate April 3-11. Unfortunately, some of the Host Families are now unavailable and new Host Families are needed. The Board awarded a contract to Campbell Construction Group LLC at their meeting last week. We have posted a one-page summary of the project on the Town web-site.
