



Decision of the Scituate Zoning Board of Appeals on the application of John Townsend and Adam Hay of Sandcastle Group, 600 Plain Street, Marshfield, MA 02050 (hereinafter, the "Applicant") for a Special Permit/Finding pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 40A, Section 6, and Scituate Zoning Bylaw (the "Bylaw") Sections 810.2 that the reconstruction/extension/alteration of an existing nonconforming single family residential structure on a nonconforming lot, and the proposed structure, although greater than 20% larger, will not be substantially more detrimental to the neighborhood than the existing nonconforming structure or lot.

The application was received, advertised and a public hearing was duly held on March 21, 2013, with the following members of the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing the application:

The subject property (the "Subject Property") at 33 Garden Road is owned by Maria E. Marcelino (See Certificate of Title No. 108927 filed with the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds). It is located in Residence A-3 Zoning District, and is not located within the Water Resources Protection District. The Subject Property is 10,000 ± SF with 100± foot frontage on Garden Road. The Applicant has provided a copy of the current tax assessment from the Town of Scituate which indicates that the single family dwelling on the Subject Property was constructed in 1925, prior to the adoption of zoning in the Town of Scituate. The pre-existing nonconformities of the Subject Property are (a) front yard setback (15.3 feet, existing structure).

The Applicant proposes to alter the existing single family dwelling on the Subject Property by adding a first floor addition that will increase living area 746 sq. ft. and 863 sq. ft. overall (more than 20% ; approximately 100%).

M.G.L. Ch. 40A Section 6 provides that "pre-existing nonconforming structures and uses may be extended or altered, provided, that no such extension or alteration be permitted unless there is a finding by the permit granting authority or by the special permit granting authority designated by ordinance or by-law that such change, extension or alteration shall not be substantially more detrimental than the existing nonconforming [structure or] use to the neighborhood."

The Board specifically FINDS that the existing single family dwelling is a pre-existing nonconforming structure/use entitled to the protection afforded in M.G.L. Ch. 40A Section 6.

In addressing whether the proposed use of the new structure will be substantially more detrimental to the neighborhood than the existing nonconforming use or structure, the Board considers the guidelines set forth in Powers v. Building Inspector of Barnstable, 363 Mass. 648 (1973), Derby Refining Company v. City of Chelsea, 407 Mass. 703 (1990), and Building Commissioner of Medford v. McGrath, 312 Mass. 461 (1942).

Based on the information presented, the Board FINDS that the proposed alteration and use will not be substantially more detrimental to the neighborhood than the existing nonconforming structure and use, and that the proposed structure or use will not be substantially different in character or substantially more detrimental or injurious to persons, property, or improvements in the vicinity. The addition to be as detailed on documents presented at the hearing including, but not limited to:

1. Accessory Dwelling Special Permit – 33 Garden Road, Town of Scituate Planning Board, Dated December 12, 2012.
2. Certified Plot Plan, 33 Garden Road, by A.S. Elliot Associates, Professional Land Surveyors, P.O. Box 85, Hopedale, MA, Dated September 24, 2012 and revised December 6, 2012
3. Plan, Marcelino Addition, 33 Garden Road, Scituate, MA 02066, Sandcastle Group, 600 Plain St., Marshfield, MA 02050, Dated December 6, 2012

This Special Permit and these findings are issued pursuant to Zoning Bylaw Sections 810.2 and G.L. Ch. 40A, Section 6.
